
Three young women from different backgrounds join the Suffrage movement in the early 20th century just before World War I. This is their story. Hampshire Book Award shortlisted title 2019.




This book provides a comprehensive look at leadership, democracy, voting and elections. It also considers the different ideologies represented in democracies.

This fascinating book looks at different aspects of Parliamentary Governments, explaining what they are, how they have come about and giving examples of such political systems around the world today.




An evocative story looking at how a murder can reinforce division, suspicion and prejudice. Davie is not affiliated with either side and this naivety helps him to discover the truth.






Joe's father was convicted for killing a hen harrier. Joe is worried that, as a young gamekeeper on a grouse moor his older brother will share the same fate.


Four friends must work together to challenge the corruption of local politicians, the police and property developers to rescue their community in a London tower block.

British crime through the ages from 1066 to the present day. Includes fact boxes and a timeline.




Written in verse, Xiomara must find her voice and sense of identity in the face of a repressive home life where a slavish adherence to religious convictions compromises all family relationships.





T




Contains a wide range of case studies, thought provoking questions and safety advice.

Includes detailed information on cyberbullying, managing social media and when to ask for help.



T



T







T



T






An exploration of the key principles of the Islamic faith and what it means to be a Muslim. Part of the “Following a Faith” series.
